

# VA plans expansion of benefits for disability claims for conditions related to certain toxic exposures

Agent Orange- The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced its plans announced its plans on May 27, 2021, to automatically review disability claims benefits for Veterans living with Parkinsonism, bladder cancer, and hypothyroidism—three new conditions were added to the list of presumptive conditions for which the Department of Veterans Affairs grants service connection to Vietnam War Veterans affected by exposure to the chemical herbicide Agent Orange.

These 3 additional conditions follow the <u>Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act</u> that guarantees Veterans who served off the shores of Vietnam can access VA health care and benefits related to their exposure from Agent Orange. This is a significant win for Vietnam-era Veterans- many of whom have waited a long time for these benefits. Vietnam-era Veterans and their survivors, who previously filed and were denied benefits for one of these three new presumptive conditions, will have their cases automatically reviewed without the need to refile a claim. Veterans and survivors will receive letters from VA informing them of their claim's review.

Airborne Hazards and Burn Pit Exposures- VA is initiating rulemaking to consider adding respiratory conditions, which may include asthma, sinusitis and rhinitis, to the list of chronic disabilities associated with military service for Veterans who served in the Southwest Asia theater of operations during the Persian Gulf War and/or after September 19, 2001, or in Afghanistan and Uzbekistan during the Persian Gulf War. ## Enhanced or Special Monthly Pension for Aid and Attendance or Housebound Status

#### Aid and Attendance (A&A)

Aid and Attendance is an additional monthly pension amount paid to a Veteran or surviving spouse to assist with the costs of providing daily care. You may be eligible if one (or more) of the following is true:

- You require help to perform activities of daily living. These include bathing, feeding, dressing, toileting, adjusting prosthetic devices or protection from environmental hazards.
- ➤ You are bedridden. This means your disability requires you to stay in bed when you are not receiving treatment.
- You are a patient in a nursing home due to mental or physical incapacity.
- ➤ You have corrected visual acuity of 5/200 or less in both eyes.
- You have concentric contraction of the visual field to 5 degrees or less.

#### Housebound

Housebound is an increased monthly pension amount paid to permanently disabled Veterans who are greatly confined to their homes. Veterans may qualify for this increased amount if **one** of the following is true:

- ➤ You have a single permanent disability evaluated as 100-percent disabling. Because of this, you are permanently confined to your immediate location.
- You have a single permanent disability evaluated as 100-percent disabling and another disability (or disabilities) evaluated as 60-percent or more.

You may not receive enhanced or special monthly pension without first establishing eligibility for VA pension. However, enhanced pension is based on a higher income limit. For this reason, a claimant who is not eligible for basic pension may still qualify for increased pension benefits. You may not receive pension at the A&A and Housebound rate at the same time.

#### **Veteran Rapid Retraining Assistance Program (VRRAP)**

The VA's Veteran Rapid Retraining Assistance Program (VRRAP) is a new program that offers education and training for **high-demand jobs** to Veterans who are unemployed because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The VA launched VRRAP as part of its continued effort to support Veterans seeking retraining and economic opportunities in response to the effects of the coronavirus pandemic. **VRRAP provides up to 12 months of tuition, fee, and monthly housing allowance payments**, based on Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits, to qualifying Veterans seeking training for employment in a high-demand occupation.

To qualify, Veterans must meet the following criteria:

- ✓ At least 22 years old, but not older than 66, and
- ✓ Unemployed because of the COVID-19 pandemic, and
- ✓ Not eligible for GI Bill or Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) benefits (or, if eligible for the Post-9/11 GI Bill, you've transferred all of your benefits to family members), and
- ✓ Not rated as totally disabled because you can't work, and
- ✓ Not enrolled in a federal or state jobs programs, and
- ✓ Not receiving unemployment benefits (including CARES Act benefits)

In partnership with the Department of Labor, the VA published a list of <u>high demand occupations</u> that includes health care, education, media, engineering, and high-tech opportunities. The list of VA <u>approved VRRAP Schools and programs</u> is regularly updated.

#### **VA Helps Veterans Avoid Foreclosure**

The Department of Veterans Affairs is offering a new COVID-19 Refund Modification option to assist Veterans who require a significant reduction in their monthly mortgage payments because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In some cases, Veterans can receive a 20% payment reduction — in others, the reduction can be even larger. This new option is part of the of <u>Biden-Harris administration's expanded</u>, <u>government-wide effort</u> to help homeowners retain their homes as they weather the economic challenges resulting from the ongoing pandemic.

Under the COVID-19 Refund Modification, VA can purchase a Veteran's past due payments and amounts of unpaid principal, depending on how much assistance is necessary, subject to certain limits. Loan servicers also modify the loan. These efforts help ensure that the Veteran can afford future mortgage payments.

Like with VA's COVID-19 partial claim option, the Veteran's deferred indebtedness from a COVID-19 Refund Modification will be established as a junior lien. The junior lien will not accrue interest; will not require monthly payments; and will only become due when the property is sold, the guaranteed loan is paid off, or the guaranteed loan is refinanced.
