Happy New Year – 2022 got here quickly and hope that you and your families had a wonderful holiday season! The new year brings the Military and Veterans Affairs Office some great new opportunities for us to work on.

We remain on track to move our main office from Monterey to Marina this April. The new building is much larger and will allow us to provide office space to other Veteran-serving organizations- effectively making a Veterans Service Center! We also look forward to continuing the fiscal sponsorship for the biennial Homeless Veterans Stand Down- currently scheduled for

June 17-19, 2022, at the Monterey County Fairgrounds. If you are a Veteran in need or willing to volunteer, please contact our Office for more information. Monterey County Supervisors Alejo and Root-Askew jointly asked for our help exploring the feasibility of establishing a California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet) – Veterans Home here in Monterey County, most likely on or near former Fort Ord. CalVet Homes include Independent Living, Assisted Living, Intermediate Nursing Care, Skilled Nursing and Memory Care for eligible Veterans. The effort to add what will be a 9th CalVet home is supported by Congressman Panetta, CA Senators Caballero and Laird, CA Assembly Members Stone and Rivas, as well as our County Supervisors. Lastly, we continue to remain in close conversation with Congressman Panetta's staff about establishing a pharmacy at the Major General William H. Gourley VA-DoD Outpatient Clinic.

Lots of great things are on the horizon for Central Coast Veterans and all of us here at the Military & Veterans Affairs Office are proud to be part of it! Thank you for service to our great Nation!

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VA won't mail out COVID kits but Veterans can get free tests at clinics



Veterans Affairs officials won't be mailing out athome <u>coronavirus</u> kits as demand for testing skyrockets across America, but they are reminding Veterans that VA medical facilities can offer free inperson tests in many circumstances.

VA leaders on acknowledged that requests for COVID-19 tests have risen significantly in recent weeks as the <u>Omicron variant of the virus</u> has swept across the globe.

Diagnostic testing is available for Veterans who are enrolled in VA health care and meet criteria from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which includes individuals who are showing symptoms of infection or have been in close contact with others who have tested positive.

To limit wait time when at the medical faciliies, VA recommends Veterans call ahead for testingor vaccination appointments. Veterans in need of emergency care can visit any medical center for aid.

VA Expands Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses (VET TEC) Program

Veterans and transitioning service-members who want to gain computer experience to start or advance a career in the high-technology industry may now be eligible for the VA's Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses (VET TEC) program that matches Veterans with a leading training provider to help them develop high-tech skills.

Veterans with at least one day of remaining GI Bill entitlement are eligible to enroll in the VET TEC program and gain high-tech skills within a matter of months. The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates information technology occupations will increase by 13 percent over the next decade, and the VET TEC paves the way for student Veterans to join this growing industry. Upon completion of the program, VET TEC graduates typically find employment in 67 days with an average salary above \$59,000.



VET TEC provides tuition for a full-time high-tech training program, a housing allowance during training, industry networking and resume workshops towards a new career in IT.

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WHAT IS "PRESUMPTIVE" SERVICE CONNECTION?

VA disability compensation benefits are a monthly, tax-free payment to Veterans who were injured, sustained a long-term illness or experienced a worsening medical condition during their military service.

In addition to compensating Veterans whose disabilities incurred while serving in the military, Veterans may also be granted compensation for specific post-service medical conditions that arose because of their military service. Known as presumptive disabilities, these conditions may not have arisen in service but may be granted as service-connected because the occurrence can be directly linked to military service. VA recently added new medical conditions to a growing list of presumptive disabilities conditions which can be presumed to have occurred because of an exposure to Agent Orange, ionizing radiation, and service in the

Did You Know?... You can have your veteran status identified on your California Driver's License or State ID



Eligible Veterans can add the word "VETERAN" to the front of their driver's license or ID card to indicate that they have served in the U.S. Military. It can also play a critical role in enabling access to certain privileges and benefits associated with being a Veteran without having to carry and produce a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. Interested Veterans need to present a valid DD-214 form to their local County Veteran Services Office to receive a Veteran Status Verification form (VSD-001). Then, the Veteran takes the signed verification form to a DMV field office for processing. DMV charges an additional \$5, plus the standard cost of a new, renewal, or duplicate license fee for this enhancement.
