The Budget-in-Brief summarizes Monterey County's Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24 budget plan by highlighting key budget features and presenting an overview of County revenues and expenses. The County's fiscal year runs from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024.

The Fiscal Year Adopted Budget for all funds governed by the Board of Supervisors, the Board of Supervisors Acting as the Board of Directors of individual Special Districts and Successor Agencies totals \$1,910,803,727 and includes 5,844 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions.

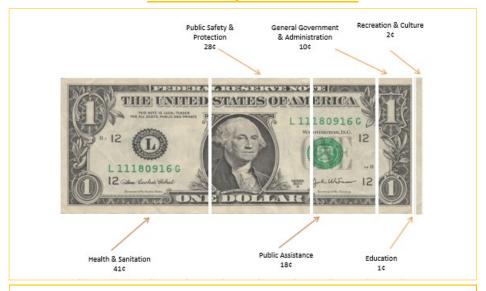

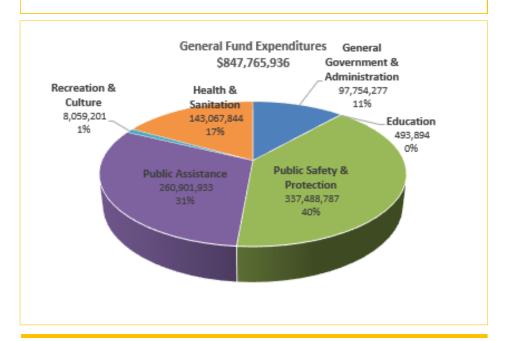

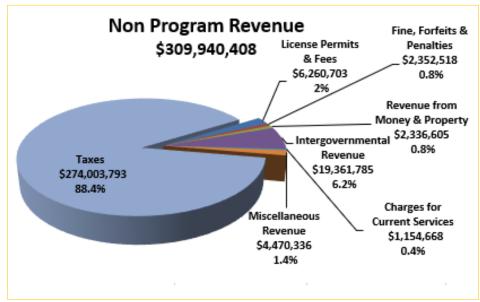
General Fund Summary

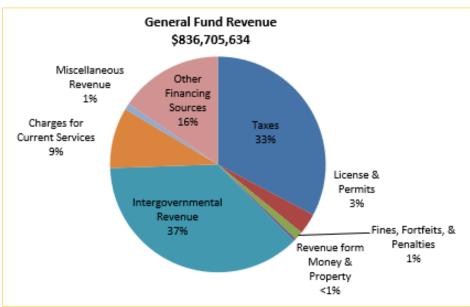
The General Fund is the County's largest fund supporting basic governmental functions related to Public Safety & Protection, General Government & Administration, Recreation & Cultural Services, Health & Sanitation, Public Assistance, and Education. The FY 2023-24 General Fund Adopted Budget includes \$847,765,936 in appropriations matched by revenues in the amount of \$836,705,634 and use of fund balance of \$11,060,302.



Non-Program Revenue

General Fund revenue is composed of program & non-program revenue. Program revenue is designated and/or statutorily required for specific programs, while non-program revenues are the County's discretionary funds, critical in addressing local priorities, and providing matching funds to leverage Federal & State monies to meet maintenance of effort requirements.

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) presented an award for Distinguished Budget Presentation to the County of Monterey, California for the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022. In order to receive this award, a government unit must publish a budget document that meets program criteria as a policy document, as an operational guide, as a financial plan and as a communication device.

This award is valid for a period of one year. The County believes that our current budget continues to conform to program requirements, and are submitting to GFOA to determine its eligibility for another award.
