


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
#### Hospitalization/Rehospitalization


#### **Percentage of Clients Hospitalized**



#### **Count of Clients Hopitalized by number of re-hospitalizations**




#### Count of Clients Hospitalized vs. total number of hospitalizations



# What was the timeliness of services provided post hospitalization for the safety net population\*

A key performance indication for mental health service delivery is the response to clients after psychiatric hospitalization. Appropirate and timely follow-up care helps reduce the risk of repeat hospitalization. A nationally recognized best practice involves follow-up with a client within 7 days after a crisis even or psychiatric hospitalization.

Our goal is to increase the percentage of clients seen within 7 days. These clients received the optimal care.

### WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF SUBSTANCE USE IN OUR ADULT SYSTEM OF CARE CLIENT POPULATION?

The severely mentally ill population served by the Adult System of Care involves serving many individuals who in addition to having a mental health diagnosis also have a substance use disorder diagnosis. We refer to this as co-occurring disorders. To best serve this group, we can enhance the use of co-occurring capable evidence based practices.











#### **COUNT OF CLIENTS SERVED BY REGION AND ETHNICITY**











#### **COUNT OF CLIENTS SERVED BY REGION AND ETHNICITY**











#### **COUNT OF CLIENTS SERVED BY REGION AND ETHNICITY**











#### **COUNT OF CLIENTS SERVED BY REGION AND ETHNICITY**











#### **COUNT OF CLIENTS SERVED BY REGION AND ETHNICITY**






#### Percent of Hispanic / Latino Clients Served




#### Ten Year Service Trend

Monterey County Behavioral Health staff collaborates with local agencies to provide a range of services to adults ages 18 years and older with serious and persistent mental illness. The overarching goal is to help consumers establish and/or maintain independence, self-sufficiency and recovery through the provision of integrated health care services that includespsychiatric, mental health, physical health and case management services. These services are provided at locations in three (3)regional clinics (Monterey Peninsula, Salinas, and Soledad/King City). The primary goal is to maintain clients in the least restrictive environment to enhance quality of life.


#### **Breakdown of Clients Served by Ethnicity**


#### **Breakdown of Clients Served by Ethnicity**

#### System of Care: Crisis, Mobile Crisis, Hospital and TAR

Crisis / Mobile Crisis intervention services are provided by County Behavioral Health staff who intervene in situations where an individual's mental or emotional condition results in behavior that may pose an imminent risk of danger to self or to another, or in situations where an individual may be gravely disabled due to a mental health condition. Psychiatric inpatient treatment in an acute hospital setting is provided to individuals on WIC 5150 / 5585. Short-term crisis residential services, an alternative to hospitalization, is available for individuals 18 years of age and older who are experiencing an acute psychiatric episode or crisis, and who do not meet the criteria for acute psychiatric inpatient care. This service is provided by a local agency. State hospitals provide mental health services for individuals on a forensic commitment, as well as for individuals who are under LPS conservatorship and require a secure treatment setting.




#### Percent of Hispanic / Latino Clients Served




#### **Ten Year Service Trend**

#### Percent of Clients Served by Region of Residence






#### System of Care: Substance Use Disorders

Services are provided on a continuum of care ranging from regularly scheduled counseling sessions in an outpatient setting to more highly structured, intensive 24-hour recovery support. Monterey County residents age 18 years and above with a diagnosis of alcohol or other substance use disorders are eligible for the continuum of SUD services. Intravenous drug users (IVDU), HIV+, and pregnant individuals receive priority admission. Narcotic or Opioid treatment services are available to Medi-Cal eligible adults with a primary diagnosis of dependence to heroin or other opiates; which serves to stabilize and decrease addiction. Substance Use Disorder Services are also available for adolescents ages 12-17 with a diagnosis of alcohol or other substance use disorder. All Substance Use services are provided by local agencies who use ASAM (American Society for Addiction Medicine) criteria to support holistic, individualized and person-centered treatment.






#### **Ten Year Service Trend**




#### **Ten Year Service Trend**

#### Service Area: Services to Improve Employability

County Behavioral Health staff assists families who receive California Work Opportunity and Responsibility for Kids (CalWORKs) benefits to address behavioral health issues that interfere with their ability to work or participate in Welfare-To-Work activities. The State Department of Rehabilitation, County Behavioral Health and a local service provider combine staff and resources to provide vocational rehabilitation services to consumers with mental health disabilities by providing a comprehensive continuum of services to assist individuals in obtaining and maintaining competitive employment. A local service provider assists adults with psychiatric disabilities and transition age youth age 18 through 25 who have mental health disorders to be successful in the educational environment of their choice.








#### Percent of Hispanic / Latino Clients Served

# Service Area: Student Mental Health Services

County Behavioral Health staff serve children who are in special education and are referred by a school psychologist. The services include individual and family counseling, group counseling, teacher consultation, psychiatric evaluation, and medication monitoring. County Behavioral Health staff also provides mental health services to students who are demonstrating emotional or behavioral difficulties that are interfering with their social, academic and emotional functioning, yet are not in special education. Services are provided in primarily at the school site as well as the clinic and in the community. A local service provider offers mental health services to North Monterey County children attending schools in the Pajaro/Las Lomas area and their family members who have a broad range of mental health needs.


#### **Service Area: Emergency Department Access**

Crisis intervention services are provided by a team of County Behavioral Health staff who intervene in situations where an individual's mental or emotional condition results in behavior that may pose an imminent danger to him/herself or to another. Psychiatric inpatient treatment in a hospital setting is provided to individuals who are gravely disabled or likely to do serious harm. Short-term crisis residential services, an alternative to hospitalization, is available for individuals age 18 and above who are experiencing an acute psychiatric episode or crisis, and who do not meet the criteria for acute psychiatric inpatient care. This service is provided by a local agency. State hospitals provide mental health services for individuals on a forensic commitment, as well as for individuals who are under conservatorship and require a secure treatment setting. These facilities also provide specialized rehabilitation, education, and psychiatric services for individuals committed under the legal classification Incompetent to Stand Trial.

#### Service Area: SUD - Intensive Services

Intensive outpatient programs offer services to individuals seeking structured programming. IOP is offered on a continuum of care and appropriateness for this level of care can be determined through an ASAM (American Society for Addiction Medicine) screening and multidimensional assessment. IOP treatment includes a prearranged schedule of core services (e.g., Counseling (individual and group using evidenced based practices), patient education, family therapy, and integrated care coordination for substance use, behavioral health, & physical health needs) for a minimum of 9 hours per week for adults or 6 hours per week for adolescents (Mee-Lee et al., 2013). To help individuals fulfill their person-centered goals, IOP incorporates other in-house treatment components like assessment, recovery services, peer support, mutual support groups, medication services, and medication assisted treatment (MAT) for alcohol, opioid, & other substance use disorders.


### Service Area: SUD - Medication Assisted Treatment

Narcotic or Opioid treatment services use pharmacological modalities and psychosocial counseling services to treat adults with a primary diagnosis of dependence to heroin or other opiates. Medi-Cal eligible adults will receive a physical examination by licensed medical professionals who are addiction experts and substance use history will be gathered by the treatment team. Pharmacological agents include opioid agonist medications such as methadone and Buprenorphine and opioid antagonist medications such as naltrexone. OTPs are heavily regulated by federal agencies and involve direct administration of medications, daily, and do not involve prescriptions taken to a retail outpatient pharmacy to access medication. In addition to providing pharmacological medications, all individuals receive one-on-one harm reduction counseling by highly trained professionals where a person-centered treatment plan is developed to achieve one's recovery-oriented goals.




### Service Area: SUD - Outpatient Services

Outpatient Treatment Centers allow individuals to receive treatment for alcohol or substance addiction while continuing with daily activities like school or work. OP services are part of a continuum of care and appropriateness for OP can be determined through an ASAM (American Society for Addiction Medicine) screening and multidimensional assessment. Service components include assessment, integrated care coordination for substance use, behavioral health, and physical health needs, counseling (individual, group, family), medication services, medication assisted treatment (MAT) for alcohol, opioid, & other substance use disorders. OP also provides the following: addiction & recovery info, 12 Step program facilitation, individualized treatment planning, communicable illness education, toxicology drug screening, discharge planning, referrals to community resources, continuing care support groups. The programs utilize several evidence-based best practices, including relapse prevention, motivational interviewing, cognitive-behavioral skills, trauma-informed treatment, and psycho-education.





### Service Area: SUD - Recovery Services

Recovery Services are designed to support recovery and prevent relapse with the objective of restoring an individual to their best possible functional level. Recovery Services emphasize a person's central role in managing their health, use effective self-management support strategies, and organize internal and community resources to provide ongoing self-management support to the individual. Medi-CAL members may receive Recovery Services based on self-assessment or provider assessment of relapse risk. Individuals no longer need to be diagnosed as being 'in remission' to access Recovery Services. Recovery Services can be provided while receiving MAT services, including NTP/OTP services. Additionally, an individual may receive Recovery Services immediately after incarceration with a prior diagnosis of alcohol or substance use disorder. Recovery services provides the following components: assessment, integrated care coordination for substance use, behavioral health, & physical health needs, counseling (individual, group, family), recovery monitoring-which includes recovery coaching and monitoring, and relapse prevention-which includes interventions designed to teach individuals how to anticipate and cope with the potential for relapse.







### Service Area: SUD - Residential Services

Residential is a short term (length of treatment varies by individual, approximately 1-3 months), treatment program that provides 24-hour structure and support for eligible Medi-Cal adults with a diagnosed alcohol or substance use disorder. Residential is part of a continuum of care and entry into this level of treatment must be determined through an approved ASAM (American Society for Addiction Medicine) multidimensional assessment. Individuals participating in this level of care reside on-site at the residential facility. Services include counseling (individual and group), family therapy, 12-step recovery programs, peer support groups, recovery services, medication assisted treatment (MAT) for alcohol, opioid, & other substance use disorders, and integrated care coordination for substance use, behavioral health, & physical health needs. Residential services can also include non-medical withdrawal management for individuals meeting withdrawal criteria. Specialized services for women and their children are available in the residential program







### Service Area: SUD - Withdrawal Management Services

Clinically managed residential withdrawal management is an organized service consisting of 24-hour structure and clinically managed support with medical evaluation and consultation services available 24 hours a day. This treatment setting has a primary focus on serving individuals who are experiencing moderate withdrawal symptoms but need 24-hour supervision/observation/monitoring and support to complete withdrawal management and increase likelihood of continuing treatment or recovery. Service components include assessment, medication services, observation recovery services, medication assisted treatment (MAT) for alcohol, opioid, & other substance use disorders, and integrated care coordination for substance use, behavioral health, & physical health needs. Individuals participating in this level of care reside on-site at the residential facility.







### **Program/Program Group: Prop 47 Mental Health**

The Prop 47 Behavioral Health program is tied to the Prop 47 Grant awarded to Monterey County Behavioral Health. The grant funds an array of services in Monterey County designed to improve recidivism rates of individuals with prior involvement in the legal system who also have a history of issues with substance use disorder and/or mental health. The direct service component of the Prop 47 Behavioral Health program functions as an access point to mental health services for those individuals who are identified as the target population and eligible for grant services, and who have been referred for assessment of mental health needs. After an initial assessment, treatment services are typically provided in group settings and/or individual counseling sessions that focus on skill-building and support.


### Program/Program Group: DTH Co-Occurring Disorder

ICT is an MHSA program, a Full Service Partnership, (FSP), and a contract with Door to Hope. This team provides a high level of care to co-occurring youth and their families. ICT is designed to prevent youth from having to be placed out of the home, who may be struggling with a co-occurring disorder. It is offered to youth ages 12 -18, who meet the co-occurring criteria and are at risk of out of home placement. This team provides individual and family therapy, as well as peer mentor support. The desired outcomes include measuring success in education, decreasing recidivism, prevention of further involvement with the Juvenile Justice system, and providing treatment in a less restrictive setting. Success is measured by youth's ability to remain at home, in school, and in their community, with no new law violations. This is a Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) program, under the co-occurring strategy. It is one of the substance abuse programs designed to meet moderate to severe needs.


The Outpatient School Team serves only children who are in special education and who are referred by a school psychologist. The pupil may be exhibiting an emotional disturbance such as depression, anxiety or a psychosis that may be interfering with the student's educational progress. The services provided include Pre-referral services per Chapter 493 for short term intervention which includes an initial assessment with possible recommendations for services or for a full Chapter 26.5 assessment if found qualified under the department guidelines. 
# Program/Program Group: CS Family Reunification FSP

Family Reunification Program is a unique and innovative program model that truly integrates Children's Behavioral Health (CBH) therapists and Family and Children's Services (FCS/DSS) social workers into one cohesive service unit. The full FRP staff is co-located, co-supervised, and cross-trained to each other's jobs. At full staffing there are three FCS social workers, permanently teamed with three clinicians from CBH. Paired in teams of two for each FRP family, they share a caseload together and jointly provide services and case management to their families. They jointly share responsibility for case planning, provision of intensive therapeutic and support services, case monitoring, family team leadership, decision-making, and managing and leading orientation and other groups. The target population for the FRP program is: those families who are court-ordered to receive family reunification services from DSS after children have been removed from the home due to severe abuse or neglect and; have significant mental health needs and; face greater-then-normal challenges in safely reuniting and creating a stable home environment that will support the mental health and emotional needs of their children.





#### Percent of Hispanic / Latino Clients Served

The Juvenile Sex Offender Response Team (JSORT) offers treatment to adolescents with sexual offender charges, in collaboration with the Probation Department. JSORT meets as a multidisciplinary team in order to meet the needs of the youth and family. Referrals are made through the Probation Department, and youth are assessed for the program. Services are implemented, in individual, group and family modalities. This team meets regularly to discuss the cases and treatment, and efforts are made to reduce the risk of re-offending and to plan reunification services for returning the offender to the home and community, with all safety factors considered.




#### **Breakdown of Clients Served by Ethnicity**


#### **Breakdown of Clients Served by Ethnicity**







# Program/Program Group: CS JJ Secure Track Custody

Monterey County Juvenile Hall provides pre-adjudication and post-adjudication services to youth on Juvenile Probation. CS JJ Secure Track is a post-adjudication service that was created as a result of SB 823 and the closure of Division of Juvenile Justice state facility, to serve the most serious juvenile offenders in Monterey County. Secure Track is an interdisciplinary team program (made up of Behavioral Health, Probation, Education, and Nursing) designed to rehabilitate youth sentenced to the program. Terms can range from 1-7 years or "juvenile life" (age 25). Secure Track provides a full continuum of mental health care, with a heavy focus on life skill development and risk management.



# Program/Program Group: CS New Paths Program

New Paths offers two levels of services for children, youth, and families in Monterey County. The first level of service is Post Hospital which ensures that children and their families are cared for and supported through a Psychiatric emergency with the goal of stabilizing. The Children's Post Hospital team receives referrals from emergency rooms and hospitals for youth under the age of 18 years old, supporting the discharge process for clients who are already open to the Children's System of Care or opening clients who are not receiving services. The Post Hospital Team is an Intensive Outpatient Program, focusing on psychiatric stabilization and short term, intensive treatment up to 12 weeks. Once stabilized, client's are opened to the New Paths portion of the program or connected to other Children's teams.

The second level of service is New Paths Outpatient Treatment, which is geared towards helping the youth after the crisis event and support the development of a "new path" to health and wellness. New Paths provides services to youth across Monterey county and the team is stationed in Salinas. The second level of services provides long-term treatment to youth under 18 years old, referred by the Access teams and Post Hospital. Treatment offers individual therapy, groups, case management, mental health rehabilitation, family psychoeducation, and medication support.

# **Program/Program Group: CS Salinas Home Partners**

The Home Partners Program is an intensive, short-term, in-home crisis intervention and family education program. It is designed to prevent the out-of-home placement of children whose emotional, social, and/or behavioral problems create a substantial risk of placement in publicly funded care, such as foster homes, group homes, correctional institutions or psychiatric facilities. This program is designed to defuse the immediate crisis, stabilize the environment, and assist families to develop more effective parenting skills and coping abilities. The principal characteristics of this program include interventions at the crisis point, treatment in the client's environment, 24 hour therapist availability, treatment that is highly individualized and concrete services as needed. Services are provided intensively and as needed for up to 20 hours a week, over a 4-6 week period. Therapist only carry a caseload of two families at a time to allow for intensive, frequent contact in order to maximize learning opportunities and work on the basic concrete and hard services needs a family may have. Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) supports this program to ensure access by monolingual families. This part of the program is referred to as: MHSA Family Preservation Program.

# Percent of Clients Served by Region of Residence





The Outpatient School Team serves only children who are in special education and who are referred by a school psychologist. The pupil may be exhibiting an emotional disturbance such as depression, anxiety or a psychosis that may be interfering with the student's educational progress. # Program/Program Group: Access AB109

In the Access AB109 Program, Monterey County Behavioral Health clinical staff collaborate with Monterey County Probation Department to provide services to men and women on PRCS and 1170h split sentences with the primary goal of assisting in the reduction of recidivism risk by targeting factors that increase an individual's risk of reoffending. Behavioral Health services include clinical assessment, treatment planning, case management, crisis intervention, referrals to substance abuse treatment and/or specialty mental health services, medication management, brief individual therapy and evidence based practice groups to target criminogenic risks and needs as identified by the Ohio Risk Assessment System. Referrals made are part of a comprehensive approach used in an attempt to reduce recidivism and improve community safety by addressing identified risk factors.







# Program/Program Group: AS BH Drug Court

Drug Treatment Court I is funded by a State CDCI grant that provides community based substance abuse treatment to individuals with felony drug charges in Monterey County. Drug Treatment Court II, is an enhancement and expansion based on a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration SAMHSA Center for Substance Abuse Treatment CSAT and the Bureau of Justice Assistance BJA Federal grant that was awarded to Monterey County in the late 2010. Treatment providers and Monterey County Staff have been trained in evidenced based practices of Motivational Interviewing and Seeking Safety, a treatment program designed to address trauma exposed individuals with substance abuse issues.









# Program/Program Group: AS Military Diversion

The California Military Diversion program establishes a pretrial diversion program for current and former members of the U.S. military who are charged with a misdemeanor offense. Under Penal Code section 1001.80, subdivision (a), the military diversion program applies to defendants accused of a misdemeanor offense who "was, or currently is, a member of the US military, and who "may be suffering from sexual trauma, traumatic brain injury [TBI], post-traumatic stress disorder [PTSD], substance abuse, or mental health problems as a result of his or her military service." If a defendant meets this criteria, the court "may" place him or her into a pretrial diversion program. In Monterey County, the military diversion court is a judicially supervised collaboration court calendar which includes the District Attorney, Public Defender, Veteran's Health Administration, Probation, Behavioral Health Bureau, Sheriff's Office and other community partners with the goal of diverting active and former members of the military who meet this criteria from the criminal justice system and into treatment.

This will be accomplished through a judicially supervised collaboration court calendar which includes the District Attorney, Public Defender, Veteran's Health Administration, Probation, the Behavioral Health Bureau [BHB], Sheriff's Office, and other community partners with the goal of reducing the veteran's contact with the criminal justice system for successful community reintegration. The Monterey County VTC is a voluntary program based on Penal Code section 1170.9, which provides judicial officers with the option of sentencing veteran's to treatment and probation instead of prison or jail if they have been convicted of certain classes of crimes, as long as a there is medical evidence which concludes that there is a nexus between the veteran's mental health/medical issue and military service. Additionally, there are post-conviction restorative relief options, such as early termination of probation, financial forgiveness of some fines and fees, reducing an eligible felony to a misdemeanor or record clearance under Penal Code section 1203.4, that may be available to the veteran once treatment/probation has been successfully completed.












# Program/Program Group: Drake House FSP

This is a full service partnership program providing services to adults 60 years + who have a serious and persistent mental illness with a co-occurring physical disorder that are risk of losing their community placement due to an ongoing chronic co-existing physical impairment. These older adult have had extensive histories of institutionalization or at high risk for a higher level of care, hospitalizations, unplanned emergency services and at high risk for skilled nursing care. Monterey County in collaboration with Drake House (Front Street) provides 24 hour residential care, intensive mental health and case management services. These older adults benefit from intensive case management preventing further deterioration of their condition and enhancing their capacity to remain in the least restrictive environment. The services are designed to maximize their participation in their recovery, and enhance their quality of life while living in their community.

Interim, Inc. will operate a licensed community-based short-term crisis residential program as an alternative to hospitalization in accordance with State of California Department of Mental Health (DMH). Crisis residential services can be therapeutic and/or rehabilitation services that are provided in a 24-hour residential treatment program for individuals experiencing an acute psychiatric episode or crisis, and who do not present criteria for acute psychiatric care. The program supports individuals in their efforts to restore, maintain and apply interpersonal and independent living skills, and access community support systems. Interventions, which focus on symptom reduction, shall also be available. Service activities shall include assessment, mental health treatment plan development, collateral, and linkage. Interim will also provide short-term emergency shelter for homeless mentally ill adults and Manzanita's nurse assistants provide a nurse consultant to assist in the development of a care plan for residents who have a co-existing medical condition.




# Program/Program Group: Interim Sunflower Garden

The Sunflower Gardens program provides supported housing services to individual with serious mental illness who are homeless or at risk of homelessness during a transition period whereby individuals are referred to this program by Monterey County Behavioral Health. The services provided to the consumers include assessments, evaluation, and assistance in accessing benefits, case management, with a major focus in helping consumers to be successful in housing by helping them to meet the terms of their leases. ### Program/Program Group: Medical Hill Rehab Center

This program provide intensive residential treatment to severely mentally ill adults. 
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
### Program/Program Group: USC TELEHEALTH

Telehealth is a virtual, outpatient clinic that provides behavioral health services using secure, videoconferencing technology. A program within the Suzanne Dworak-Peck School of Social Work at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles, Telehealth has partnered with the Monterey County Behavioral Health Bureau to establish 3 tele-suites in Salinas and South Monterey County regions where clients may participate in individual therapy using a remote, videoconferencing platform. Clients are Monterey County residents living in underserved, vulnerable communities who are ages 12 and above, including adolescents, transitional age youth, adults, and older adults experiencing mild to moderate psychosocial problems or mental health conditions.

The Adult Post Hospital Team provides support to beneficiaries who are transitioning from hospital inpatient or emergency department care due to a primary psychiatric or substance use condition, and are in need of establishing new outpatient Behavioral Health services. The Adult Post Hospital Team provides discharge coordination support for adults newly referred to Behavioral Health to help ensure timely access and linkage to follow-up outpatient Behavioral Health care by providing assessment, short term case management, linkage, referrals, medication management, and other supportive services to help individuals access needed resources to help them stabilize in the community following discharge from a hospital setting. Established clients will be redirected to their existing treatment teams for ongoing care coordination and discharge planning support.


### Program/Program Group: CS CHERISH

The Cherish Center was established in Monterey County by the Department of Social Services (DSS)as a temporary receiving center for all children who are assessed for removal from home due to allegations of severe abuse and/or neglect. The Cherish Center was designed to be a friendly and inviting home-like setting for children and youth to receive emotional support and physical care from the Center's child care staff, while the DSS social worker completes an investigation and explores possible placement options for the child(ren). While a child may remain at the Center for as long as 23 hours, the average length of stay is approximately 8 to 10 hours. The Cherish Center therapist provides a brief mental health assessment for virtually all children who enter the Center, provides guidance to the Center staff on responding to emotional or behavioral problems, and is available to provide support and guidance to caretakers after the child has been placed in foster care or with relatives.


### Program/Program Group: Emergency Department Access

Crisis intervention services are provided by a team of County Behavioral Health staff who intervene in situations where an individual's mental or emotional condition results in behavior that may pose an imminent danger to him/herself or to another. Psychiatric inpatient treatment in a hospital setting is provided to individuals who are gravely disabled or likely to do serious harm. Short-term crisis residential services, an alternative to hospitalization, is available for individuals age 18 and above who are experiencing an acute psychiatric episode or crisis, and who do not meet the criteria for acute psychiatric inpatient care. This service is provided by a local agency. State hospitals provide mental health services for individuals on a forensic commitment, as well as for individuals who are under conservatorship and require a secure treatment setting. These facilities also provide specialized rehabilitation, education, and psychiatric services for individuals committed under the legal classification Incompetent to Stand Trial.


The Community Crisis Services team responds to calls for crisis support that come through the 24/7 Access Crisis Line as well as the Emergency Communications / 911 dispatch center, and provides brief crisis intervention, de-escalation, triage, risk / safety assessment, referral and linkage to individuals and families experiencing behavioral health crisis in the community. The team works in an integrated and supportive manner providing mobile crisis field response when appropriate both in conjunction with and independently of law enforcement and other first responder partners depending on the situation. The team can provide law enforcement and other treatment providers with specialized assistance in responding to individuals, youth, and families in crisis. They collaborate to recognize the signs of psychiatric distress; work to deescalate a mental health crisis; provide resources, and link people with voluntary outpatient services and/or treatment as appropriate. This team seeks to provide support to stabilize the situation in the community to avoid unnecessary hospitalizations and divert from emergency resources (hospital/jail) when appropriate while providing linkage to ongoing care as needed. They facilitate involuntary hospitalization when clinically indicated and act as liaisons with emergency personnel as well as receiving hospitals or providers for continuity of care. The team works collaboratively with other Behavioral Health programs and hospital partners for continuity of care as well as discharge planning coordination to ensure timely access to needed ongoing services following a hospitalization for a behavioral health crisis. They also provide follow-up and outreach and engagement services in the community in response to referrals.










### **Breakdown of Clients Served by Ethnicity**






