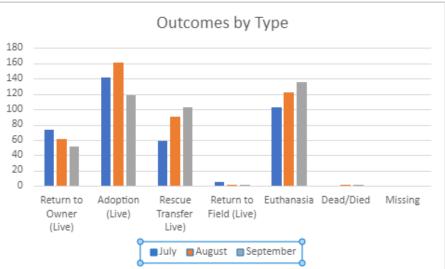

Cats: 56.52%

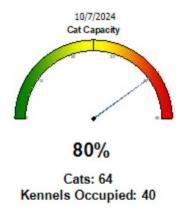

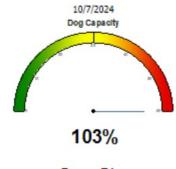
How are the animals coming into the shelter?

Animal Care Report (prepared by Animal Services Supervisor, Petra Lewis)

Stats related to your team/unit, program updates: September Update:

- September rescue numbers: 103 animals were transferred to rescue: 68 dogs and 26 cats (and 9 other animals). Some of the rescue partners that took in transfers from the shelter include Milo, New Life Asher House, Peace of Mind Dog Rescue, Dobies and Little Paws, and Shep Heroes. Of those 68 dogs, 11 were from the hoarding case the ACOs went out on in August. Given how unsocialized they were and their varying medical conditions, it wasn't easy to secure rescue for them. Our Rescue Coordinator, Gina Wolf, and our Senior Animal Care Tech, Leah Gast, worked tirelessly to get them out of the shelter.
- The surge of orphaned kittens surged through September, which is typical, and affected our cat kennel capacity. We refer to it as our third wave of kittens. On September 29th, during our Sunday Pop Up Adoption event, we offered free cat adoptions. We adopted out roughly 20 kittens in 3 hours!
- Besides underage kittens, we are also seeing an uptick in underage puppies. We took in 12 underage puppies in a two-week period.
- Animal Care staffing: One F/T ACT is still out on leave. This continues to impact staff and day-to-day operations. Also, we continue to deal with call-outs while trying to accommodate PTO requests. Animal care definitely feels pressured by our staffing issues.
- We currently have 36 kittens in foster and 9 puppies.

In progress:

- Finalizing the update of rescue partner application process.
- Behavior Assessment Protocol is still in progress.

<u>Front Office Report</u> (from Principled Office Assistant, Gaby Gonzalez)

Special Kudos & Trends:

Effective October 5th, Saturday adoption hours have changed from 1-4pm to 11am-4pm. This was implemented as a direct result of our 'Extended Hours'. The Front Office noticed a huge increase in adoptions when we opened earlier two Saturdays a month and made the decision to make this permanent change. We have high hopes that this trend of higher adoptions on these days will increase.

Our recent change in lobby hours has also proven successful. We have been able to serve our community with licensing, reclaiming of animals and other general questions. This has helped the afternoon be more adoption focused.

DocuPet Licensing:

Communications from Docupet to our pet owners started the week of September 16th. To facilitate the gap of communications to Pet Owners, we are waiving late fees until October 31st.

We have noticed an increase in calls regarding our new licensing program. Our community has been very supportive. They have provided positive feedback regarding the simplicity of licensing. Especially with the 24/7 Homesafe feature that will facilitate Pet/Owner reunification.

Licensing Update:

We are still working with Docupet to get License Compliance reports created by jurisdiction. We expect this to be ready by the next meeting.

Extended Hours/PopUp Adoption:

September adoptions during our extended hours and Sunday PopUp resulted in a total of 79 adoptions. Which was 66% of the total adoptions for the month of September!

Vaccine Clinics:

On September 25, we had 32 animals come thru our Vaccine Clinics. We are offering DA2PP, FVRCP, Rabies and Microchips. All dogs receive a free 1 year license. Next clinic is scheduled for October 23, 2024.

Vet Compliance:

Current number of veterinary offices complying is 25 out of 30. All non-compliant offices have received a letter and follow up call. Next steps include a hand delivered 2nd letter from Health Department.

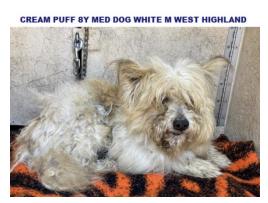

PRELIMINARY ANALYSIS:

Referral Summary & Background:

On September 5th, 2024, Board Referral No. 2024.11 was assigned to the Health Department to have staff look at modifying the County's Rooster Ordinance in order to make it more effective at eradicating cockfighting operations in unincorporated Monterey County.

The County of Monterey adopted its Rooster Ordinance in 2015. One of the main purposes of the ordinance was to prevent illegal cockfighting. There are several aspects of the ordinance, however, that make it difficult to enforce. While other counties across the state who have rooster ordinances limit the number of roosters a person can have with a permit, the County of Monterey's ordinance allows for up to 499 roosters in certain zoning areas. Additionally, the County of Monterey's ordinance places the burden of proof on Animal Control to prove that cockfighting is taking place.

Proposed Project Description:

This referral asks staff to investigate making the following changes to the County's Rooster Ordinance (and other changes as they see fit):

 Placing limits on the maximum number of roosters allowed, similar to other counties in CA, possibly a sliding scale based on lot size. Legistar File Number: PAR 24-012

2. Placing the burden of proof on the permit seeker to show that they are not using birds for cockfighting.

Animal Services, through Hitchcock Road Animal Services, enforces County of Monterey Ordinance 8.50, Requirements for Keeping Five or More Roosters. Currently, HRAS has 60 pending permit cases in the unincorporated areas in Monterey County, with 15 current permits and 15 expired permits.

Hitchcock Road Animal Services staff have already met internally to review potential modifications to the Rooster ordinance. Prior to making recommendations, staff intends to also meet with other County departments and external organizations that are stakeholders in the enforcement process of this ordinance:

- 1. Housing and Community Development
- 2. Agricultural Commissioner
- 3. Sheriff
- 4. SPCA for Monterey County

Estimated Project Cost:

At this time, there is no projected cost for this review and update.

Staffing Level Estimate:

Animal Services will have 3-4 staff members assigned to this project and will collaborate with County Counsel and various departments. This will take approximately 40-60 hours of cumulative staff time.

Departmental Challenges:

Limited staffing continues to remain a challenge for Animal Services.

Proposed Response Date:

Hitchcock Road Animal Services staff estimates to take about 6 months to review the ordinance, meet with stakeholders and work with County Counsel on modifications before bringing back an updated ordinance.

This work supports the County of Monterey Health Department 2018-2024 Strategic Plan Goal: 4) Engage MCHD workforces and improve operational functions to meet current and developing population heath needs.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

Hitchcock Road Animal Services staff will continue to have discussions with representatives from stakeholders from other agencies and departments.
