Argument Against Measure C

How has your cost of living fared over the last few years? What about that of your neighbors? Rather than cast a vote in favor of this bond measure for West Hills Community College District, School Facilities Improvement District No.2 we ask you to consider the following:

This bond measure, when accounting for interest, is estimated to impose \$32.0 million on the people of this district. Perhaps you think your share of that burden is well worth paying, given the promise of improved facilities for your local educational institute. We agree that education is important, and if you feel that this is a cause worth giving money towards, we applaud your generosity and your desire to contribute to your community. But we ask you to consider other options to fund these projects; if you are willing to contribute to these in the form of a tax, would you be willing to do so through voluntary charity instead?

Think again of your neighbors: many of them have struggled the past few years, and for some, even \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed property value will represent a substantial increase in their cost of living. That's less money available to put food on the table, pay those expensive medical bills, or even to save money for their own children's future higher education. And don't think that this will only impact property owners- higher property taxes for landlords often results in tenants paying higher rents. We applaud the community spirit of those who wish to raise money for a worthy cause; we simply ask that they turn first towards voluntary means to do so, especially given the difficult financial times that many find themselves in. Allow your neighbors to decide for themselves which causes they choose to fund, and vote NO on Measure C.
