### **Taking Action for a Healthy Future**

The public health system in Monterey County used the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) framework to produce two key planning documents, the **2014 Community Health Assessment** which highlighted health concerns and disparities in the county and the **2014-2018 Monterey County Community Health Improvement Plan** or (CHIP).

The CHIP's vision is for community members to work in partnership with agencies and organizations to improve and sustain health through shared leadership, strategic planning, meaningful community engagement, and coordinated action. This is to be accomplished by focusing on **equity, prevention, partnership, and policy** across three key strategic priorities:

- 1) Empower the community to improve health through programs, policies, and activities;
- 2) Enhance community health and safety by emphasizing prevention; and
- 3) **Ensure access** to culturally and linguistically appropriate, customer-friendly, quality health services.

To address the major health concerns and disparities in the county, the CHIP has an Action Plan which summarizes important community strategies, stakeholders, goals, and measures of progress.

### Where are we now?

Considerable effort has occurred in the first year since the plan was developed. Initially the plan provided examples of partners. Now specific initiatives have been identified as leading particular strategies. The attached matrix highlights the upcoming fiscal year plans for various initiatives as aligned with key strategies and the three initiatives.

Importantly, United Way of Monterey County, through its Impact Monterey County and Champions of Change initiatives, have adopted the CHIP objectives for their long-range collective impact efforts, as indicated in the Crosswalk between CHIP/Strategic Initiatives and IMC Priorities, which is a part of this report.
