- Unfortunately, most foodborne illnesses are underreported and preventable
- In addition, there's a lack of easily accessible information on food safety and handling
- Today, there's an opportunity to deliver important and urgent information in a variety of languages, delivery methods and programs
- Especially here in Central California where we have a growing diverse and multicultural community which requires a unique approach

Adopting modern media will expand our reach and drive focus on food safety

- Today our system of communication is limited to printed flyers, food safety conferences and classes as well as signage for facility operators
- There's an opportunity to broaden the delivery channels to include:
 - A social media presence across Facebook, Twitter and other platforms
 - A robust web site with easily accessible information available in multiple languages to meet the needs of our multi-cultural communities
 - A video library of food safety training, educational webinars and public service announcements easily accessible through YouTube and the web
- A targeted, balanced and coordinated system of communication can help us break through language and cultural barriers
